Supplies you'll need to bring to class: Paint on hardboard panels if you can because of the hard surface which you will be scratching into. Otherwise, use watercolor paper (with oil ground or gesso, 2 layers painted on) or oil paper sold by Arches. Can use inexpensive canvas panels in various sizes if you want. Not the stretched canvas.

Painting Panels

- 12"x12" or smaller. Remember you will need to transport these home and they will not be totally dry at the end of our class (if left here, I will fix up an area to store them). Panel depths are available in flat (1/8") or ¾", 1.5", and 2" Recommended panels: Gessobord by Ampersand. Available through Dick Blick and other vendors.
- Arches Oil Paper one pad 9x12. (I also will provide 2 sheets, see below). We will tape off with the 1" painter's tape small sections of 5x7.
 - Good for multiple studies/experiments and small work.
- Squeegee or wide blade Color Shaper (pieces of cardboard, matboard, or old credit card also work). (I bought an inexpensive plastic one from a hardware store and I do have some to share).
- Roll of wax paper for layering and transporting panels home, also for texturing
- Paper Palette Roll of Freezer Paper (grocery store) is a good inexpensive one. Can
 use this for the wax paper also.
- Oil paints a basic set &/or some of your favorite colors. If you do not have oil
 paints, there will be some at the Paradise you can use, and I will have extra myself.
- Clean, empty tin can for solvent (tuna, or cat food tin is perfect size)
- Protective hand cream or gloves
- Painter's tape (removable blue wide enough to cover the edges of your panels) on the 2" deep panels you can use either a 2" or 3" tape. 2 layers of tape to keep the paint from bleeding onto the sides. The 1" tape is good for the small work.
- Any interesting "mark making" tools. Such as popsicle sticks, bamboo skewers, etc.
 Even bubble wrap.

Supplies the instructor will provide:

- Newsprint pad form 18 x 24.
- Brushes just a few: old splayed or stiff ones are fine
- Paper towels
- Cold wax medium (Gamblin)
- Odorless turpentine/mineral spirits (Gamsol or Turpenoid)

- 4" <u>soft</u> rubber brayer (speedball is best and most durable) (soft not hard rubber) I have 2 rubber brayers and 2 wooden brayers. Will need to share these if you do not have one.
- Palette Knives (1 or 2) trowel blade type
- Small Whisk Broom (straw type from hardware store), small pieces of matboard, sponges, dish scrubber, anything else that you think might make interesting texture.
- Powdered Marble
- Charcoal and graphite.
- Gessoed Watercolor Paper (2 sheets, size 9x12 which I will tape off)

Optional Supplies:

- Oil paint sticks (2 or 3) not oil pastels, also called Oilbars, R&F pigment sticks, oil sticks.
- Metallic paints: in any form dry pigments &/or paint sticks, tube paint and also acrylic paint.
- Acrylic Paint (you can use acrylic paint on the first layers and put oil paint over the acrylic.
 But not the opposite.) Sometimes I put in my beginning marks with acrylic paint, charcoal and graphite, let dry and then use the cold wax and oil.
